



**PROGRAMS THAT WORK FOR COMMUNITIES:  
An Inventory of Some Intergenerational Programs in Maryland**

**Compiled by the Maryland Intergenerational Coalition**

*Spring 1999 – Spring 2000*

In order to stimulate and support intergenerational opportunities at the community level, the Maryland Intergenerational Coalition began to inventory existing intergenerational activities in the State in April 1999. With help from the Association of Elementary and Secondary School Principals, the Coalition mailed a survey to all public schools in Maryland. The schools were asked about their involvement in intergenerational programming.

The responses revealed a wide variety of exciting, creative, and meaningful programs, which promote interactions between children and elders, enhancing the meaning of "community." Information received from the schools is summarized on the following pages. Sustained programs are listed first; annual one-day intergenerational activities follow.

In addition to information received from the schools, there are summaries of other programs we have identified. Please note that the information contained in these summaries may change without notice. In the future, the Coalition hopes to contact other constituencies that may sponsor or participate in intergenerational activities.
