PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT MATTERS! Ready At Five held three full-day STEM Institutes for Early Educators reaching 28

High-quality early childhood educational experiences begin with high-quality early childhood educators. In 2014, Ready At Five supported the personal and professional development of early childhood practitioners in Maryland by hosting two School Readiness Symposia headlined by national early childhood researchers whose insight and expertise influence behavior, instructional strategies, and the quality of early childhood education in the state by focusing on what really works for young children. More than 450 early educators, policy makers, and state and local early childhood stakeholders were informed and impacted by the practical, powerful strategies offered by Dr. Kelly Mix and Dr. Richard Prather on the importance of math in early childhood and Ellen Galinsky's keynote on executive functioning as outlined in her book. Mind in the Making.

Ready At Five held three full-day STEM Institutes for Early Educators reaching 28 practitioners. Institutes are designed to create highly trained STEM "Fellows" who benefit from consistent, sustained professional development provided by experts in the field. They are a model of professional development that works.

Ready At Five's cadre of trained, effective VIOLETS (Vocabulary Improvement and Oral Language Enrichment Through Stories) teachers continues to grow through the delivery of professional development and one-on-one classroom-based coaching sessions. 103 new VIOLETS classrooms were started in 2014. There are now over 475 classrooms throughout Maryland where VIOLETS is being implemented to support young children's language development.

All of Ready At Five's professional development is designed to increase the knowledge and skills of those professionals who work with young children, creating learning experiences that have long-lasting outcomes.

FAMILIES MATTER!

Parents, early educators and families are children's first teachers. Ready At Five knows that family engagement in the early years is a critical first step in a child's school readiness. Ready At Five's Learning Parties are highly-interactive, teacher-led family & child events that help parents learn how to encourage and enhance their children's skills and abilities and to practice those techniques with their children,

building stronger connections between school and home. Learning Party curricula support the seven domains of learning (Language and Literacy, Science, Math, Social Foundations, Physical Well-Being and Motor Development, Social Studies and The Arts) that lead to school readiness and vocabulary enrichment at home. A new curriculum in health was created in partnership with the University of Maryland School of Medicine's Department of Pediatrics, and is now being implemented. More than 12,000 families and children have benefited from our Learning Parties since 2008.

Ready At Five's monthly ParentTips and Parents Matter publications are resources developed to support families that are delivered in person, in print and on our newly redesigned, mobile-friendly website.

NEXT YEAR MATTERS!

In 2015, Ready At Five will continue to create and deliver high-quality resources and professional development opportunities to benefit children, families, and early childhood practitioners. In partnership with the Maryland State Department of Education Division of Early Childhood Development, Ready At Five will produce the 2014-15 School Readiness Report and associated publications, reporting on the results of the new, more robust Kindergarten Readiness Assessment administered for the first time in late fall. Instead of focusing solely on kindergarten readiness, the new assessment looks at and defines specific learning progressions at various intervals throughout early childhood, making it possible to identify areas of need and guide instructional strategies.

Building on the success of the VIOLETS
Program, Ready At Five will develop PETALS
(Promoting Enrichment to Advance Language
Skills), a curriculum designed to give early
educators and families the guidance needed
to support the development of oral language
and literacy skills for children ages 18 months
to three years, particularly young English
Language Learners (ELLs) and children with
low expressive language skills. A shared Read
Aloud approach, a strong family engagement
approach, and an evaluation process will be
embedded in PETALS.

Ready At Five will leverage online learning technology to refine and strengthen its training delivery models to build capacity through expanded professional development efforts for our Learning Parties, VIOLETS Program, and STEM Institutes.

Ready At Five will craft a new Strategic Plan that will chart its course in reducing the achievement gap, strengthening Maryland's early childhood workforce, and promoting family engagement starting at birth, so that all children are ready for success. The strategic plan will include outcomes-based evaluation efforts to identify effective practices that will raise the quality of care, services and resources for Maryland's children and families.


